The Progressive of March, 2007 had a commentary consisting of quips from Molly Ivins' columns. Molly, who wrote for *The Progressive* for twenty years, recently died of breast cancer. Following are some of those excerpts:

"Maybe we should add a rule that we can't invade any country the President can't pronounce." (June, 2001)

"My worry is that Bush is painting himself into a corner with his rhetoric. This is not a war; it's a

gigantic police operation in the face of a crime beyond all understanding. . . . Back home in Texas, the sign outside our neighborhood strip joint says, 'Hot Babes, Cold Beer. Nuke'Em, GW.'" (November, 2001)

"It's hard to convince people you are bombing that you're doing it for their own good." (December, 2001)

"You have to admit, the corporations are getting prompt service from Republicans in return for their donations." (January, 2003)

"So constant is the reiteration of the words 'coalition,' 'coalition forces,' and 'coalition position' that you might assume one actually exists. . . . Eritrea and Ethiopia do not a coalition make." (May, 2003)

"I have a suggestion for a withdrawal deadline: let's leave before we've killed more Iraqis than Saddam Hussein did." (October, 2003)

"He's not bright enough to be President. For a long time, anyone who questioned Bush's ability to think was pointed to the opinion polls and told that discussing whether or not the President is borderline stupid was bad manners and counterproductive.
