# **Experimentally Confirmed: Not a Trifle.**

I welcome the expression of a differing point of view by MW in the January 2006 newsletter. But I disagree and here is why.

The writer's view is that posting the Ten Commandments in public places is a trifling matter, that "passive public expressions that no one is required to venerate can only qualify as trifles". That view was experimentally tested by RRF in August 2001 when we put the issue of removing Fargo's Ten Commandments monument from public property before the City Commission. The public response was immediate, substantial, hysterical, and furious. The Fargo Human Relations Commission held a meeting to hear public opinion, and the turnout was so heavy that it had to hold a second meeting, attended by over 300 people. RRF was excoriated in talk shows and letters to the editor. The fact is that such monuments have immense symbolic value for part of the community, and the presence of a RELIGIOUS symbol on PUBLIC property is the very essence of the value. Indeed, religion was equated with patriotism and nonbelief with treason. That experiment indicates the writer's view to be incorrect. The issue cannot be classified as a trifle.

The writer also notes that "Human beings are cracked pots, faulty switches, and broken pipes. We are all capable of the most egregious errors and abuse of our fellows and so it behooves us to exercise grace and good will in the allowance of each other's freedoms." Quite so, an excellent argument for courtesy and compromise and good humor in the daily round. However, as a statement on human nature, it implies that democracy cannot work and that our government is based on a misapprehension. The issue is one of principle, of legal precedent and interpretation, of where the boundary between church and state is to be drawn. That is why the issue ended up in federal court instead of being placed before Miss Manners.

The writer explains the point at which matters are not trifling and, I suppose, where objection is justified: "Requiring me to pay the support of the local preacher bites harder. Enforcing a religious loyalty oath to hold public office twists my arm." At such a point, however, the Constitution would already have been thrown out the window, and the situation would be far beyond the possibility of peaceful protest. The time to speak up is when you can, not when you can't.

The fact that a large segment of my community is incapable of rational discussion of the Ten

Commandments issue is not a trifle to me. But you will not find me dismissing or excusing that segment as "cracked pots". I have faith in the common man and the common woman. I have faith in their empathy, their compassion, their concern for the community, their willingness to listen to other views, and their ability to learn, to think, and to change. I have faith in democracy. I believe the best way to make my community capable of rational discussion on this or any other issue is not to avoid discussion, but to engage in it.
